

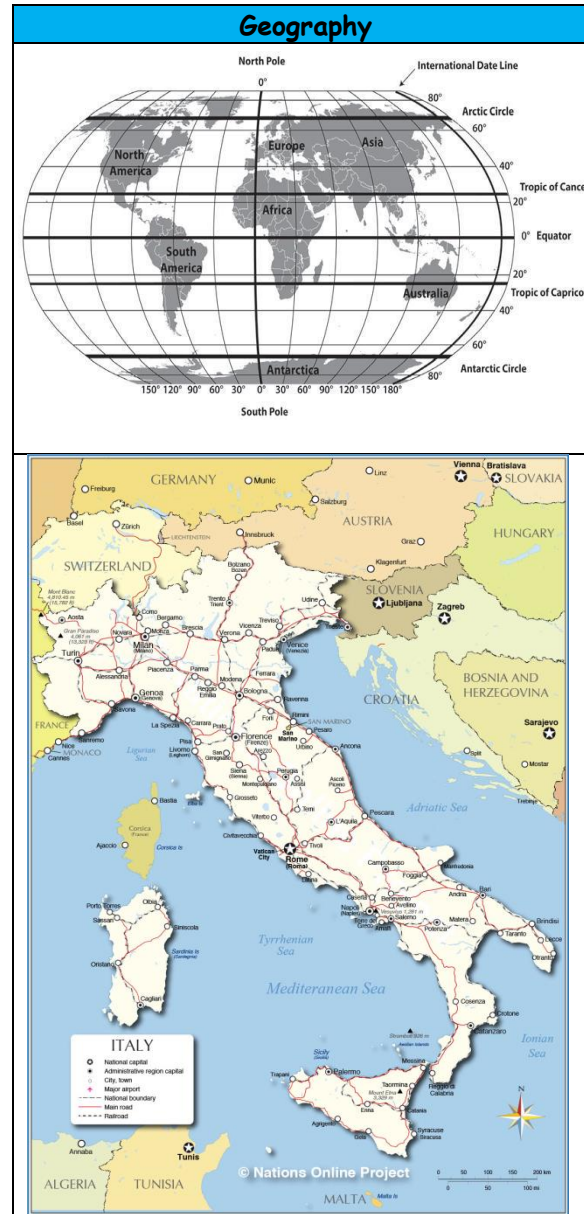

	<p>Occupation Playwright, actor and poet</p> <p>Born April 26, 1564 baptized in Stratford-upon-Avon, England (likely born on April 23rd)</p> <p>Died April 23, 1616 in Stratford-upon-Avon, England</p> <p>Best known for: Writing plays such as Romeo and Juliet, Hamlet, and Macbeth. His plays were performed for both Queen Elizabeth I and King James I.</p> <p>The Globe Theatre His company built The Globe Theatre after theirs was shut down. It could house up to 3,000 spectators and had a uniquely designed stage with a painted ceiling, columns, and stage wall. They had specially trained musicians who made special effects noises during the plays.</p>

City	An inhabited place of greater size, population, or importance than a town or village.
Country	A nation with its own government, occupying a particular territory.
Dynamics	The varying levels of volume of sound in different parts of a musical performance.
Lake	A large area of water surrounded by land.
Latitude	The measurement in degrees of a part of the Earth in relation to the north or south of the Earth's equator.
Longitude	The measurement in degrees east or west of an imaginary line that passes through Greenwich, England.
Mountain	A large natural elevation of the earth's surface rising from the surrounding level.
Orchestra	A group of instrumentalists, especially one combining string, woodwind, brass, and percussion sections and playing classical music.
Pitch	The degree of highness or lowness of a tone.
River	A large natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea, a lake, or another river
Tempo	The speed at which a passage of music is or should be played.
